Hilary,

Do these assist. One of the principle cases is *R v Atkins and Atkins* [2009] EWCA Crim 1876. But it quotes from:

R v Gardner [2004] EWCA Crim 1639: - 'Now has he [– the expert –] gone too far in the material available to him? You cannot test his results in the way in which an examiner can test a student's examination paper in mathematics, and so you will want to approach his evidence with caution.'

Additionally, in a published speech by the Senior Presiding Judge LJ Leveson in 2009 to an expert witness conference:

'The answer is to examine what the expert says from a general scientific perspective, to examine the rigour of the approach and whether it complies with accepted scientific methodology; whether there is a use or misuse of statistics;'
