The letter itemises five questions as to why his GP, Dr Crocock did or did not do something all of which are relevant to the benefit of hindsight.

Mr Duggan had the opportunity of satisfying his grievances when he met Dr Crocock at the conciliation meeting that was convened on the 27th November 2002. And still remained dissatisfied even after answers were given to the items in question as follows.

1. Dr Crocock admits he was not aware of any long-term problems with prescribing "Cyproterone" or that he was over-prescribing.
2. Dr Crocock admitted not noticing the missing liver function tests.
3. Dr Crocock admitted misunderstanding instructions in the letter of 20th May 1999.
4. Dr Crocock admitted he was unaware of over-prescribing.
5. Dr Crocock informed Code A that the practice had changed procedures since his complaint regarding vaccinations and the over 75's.
