Date set for hearing into pensioner's hospital death

She said: 'It's been a long struggle to even get a date settled. That's considering my inquest was granted by Jack Straw in January 2009 and it was supposed to be heard with other cases at the time.

'Then it was hived off separately and it's taken all this time to get a date settled and I find that extraordinary.

'I don't think it will be delayed this time, even though it has been postponed so many times before.

Mrs Richards was taken to the Royal Haslar Hospital after she suffered a fall in Glen Heathers care home

where she had been staying. After her operation, Mrs Richards was transferred to Gosport War Memorial Hospital, in Bury Road, for rehabili-

During the course of her treatment she was given pain-

She died under the care of Dr Jane Barton.


Following Mrs ards' death, her daughter approached police concerns over her mother's

It was this case that prompted an investigation by Hampshire Constabulary into deaths at the hospital.

Inquests into the deaths of five other patients at the hospital took place in 2009.

A jury ruled that drugs prescribed by Dr Barton contributed to the deaths.

Last year, Dr Barton's application to have her name removed from the General Medical Council register was accepted – she will not be able to practise in the UK
