

Panel urged to strike off doctor in deaths probe

Calls for medic to face ban after elderly patients died in hospital

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A DOCTOR accused over elderly patient deaths at Gosport War Memorial Hospital should be banned from practising, a panel heard.

Kark, Tom for the General Medical Council, said erasing GP Jane Barton's name from the medical register was the only option to 'protect patients and public confidence in the profession.'

Dr Barton is accused of serious professional misconduct relating to 12 elderly patients who died at the Bury Road site between 1996 and 1999 - a charge she denies

All of the patients died on Dryad or Daedalus wards between 1996 and 1999, when the GP was clinical assistant.

Dr Barton was found guilty of prescribing potentially hazardous and inap-proriate drug doses at the end of a hearing in August. It also found the GP's prescriptions could have led to patients being over-medicated.

The panel has now reconvened to decide whether her actions amounted to serious professional misconduct and to decide what action, if

any, she should face.

Mr Kark told a five-strong General Medical Panel at Regents Place, Euston Road, London: 'The failings demonstrated in this case were so serious that despite the passage of time the only sanction that will protect the public and public confidence in the profession is one of erasure.

Timothy However Langdale QC, described Dr Barton as an 'experienced, caring and conscientious GP,' before handing the panel a bundle of 184 testimonials in support of her

He said: 'It can surely be said that a clear demonstration of her commitment and dedication to her work has been given by her continuing to provide excellent care to her patients, despite having had allegations of various kinds hanging over her head, as well as the strain of practising for some 10 years.

Dr Barton's conduct is being examined in relation to the deaths of Geoffrey Packman, 67 - known as Mick, Elsie Lavender, 83, Eva Page, 87, Alice Wilkie, 81, Robert Wilson, 74, Elsie Devine, 88, Jean Stevens, 73, Enid Spurgeon, 92, Gladys Richards, 91, Ruby Lake, 84, Leslie Pittock, 82, and Arthur Cunningham, 79 - known as Brian.

Charity in plea over foster care shortage

CHILDREN's charity Barnardo's is calling for more people to become foster carers.

The charity reports that 850 foster carers are needed in the south-east of England, and that applications for children to be taken into care are on the

Speaking during Barnar-do's Fostering and Adoption Week 2010, which ends on Sunday, the charity's director for London, East and South East England, Delroy Pomell, said: 'Persistent, chronic child neglect and maltreatment is not uncommon in the southeast of England and the rise in the number of care applications since the death of baby Peter shows an encouraging change of awareness.

'We must continue to support social workers to intervene early when they feel a child is at risk. The increase in referrals is resulting in an urgent call on expenditure, and the government must find the funds.

Fire crews free lift users

HAMPSHIRE FIRE and rescue crews were called out to two lift incidents yesterday.

Crew members from Southsea Fire Station were called out at 12.48pm, to Fratton Railway Station.

They released a man and two children who had become stuck when the lift's doors wouldn't open at the top of the bridge between platforms one, two and three.

The crew was called out again at 4.05pm.

This time they attended a woman who had become trapped inside the lift at the five-storey Warrior House, on Wickham Street, at The Hard, Portsmouth.

A Hampshire Fire and Rescue spokesman 'Neither incident was serious, but it can be distressing to be trapped in a lift, particularly if the person inside is claustrophobic. Young people can also find it difficult.

'In these incidents, the problem was simple and we were able to open the doors without difficulty. We spoke to the people inside the lifts and they were calm, which helped us act quickly to free them.
