The Derby Evening Telegraph and Nottingham Evening Post both report on the fitness to practise case of Dr Alastair Graham who is accused of failing to call an emergency ambulance or give penicillin to a girl he diagnosed with possible meningitis.

The Peterborough Evening Telegraph reports on Dr Jonathan Okechukwu Okonkwo who was suspended by the GMC for 18 months last March for prescription fraud. The GMC has now announced that the suspension will be extended until October next year.

The Western Daily Press and the Western Morning News have both reported on the fitness to practise hearing of Dr Wulf Franzen. Dr Franzen has been allowed to continue practising following a hearing where the panel heard how an elderly patient died after he failed to record he had even visited her – despite already being warned about this dangerous practice.

Other News

The Press and Journal report that the jury is still out on the two NHS doctors accused of bomb attacks on Glasgow Airport and London. Doctor Bilal Abdulla and Mohammed Asha are accused of conspiracy to murder and to cause explosions.

The Daily Express reports on the inquest into the man who died of a heart attack after waiting four hours to be seen by a doctor in casualty at Manchester Royal Infirmary. Following the case, the hospital unit has now reviewed its procedures.

The Daily Mail notes some research undertaken by the University of Cork which found that doctors and medical students were the worst at following hand washing guidelines.

There is widespread coverage of the NHS doctor, allegedly held captive by her parents, who was freed by a Bangladesh court in a landmark legal victory under the UK's Forced Marriage Act. Dr Humayra Abedin from east London was brought before the High Court in Dhaka and is on her way back to the UK.

A letter in the Daily Telegraph mentions how a call to an emergency doctor on Sunday evening resulted in nearly a 5 hour wait. The letter states that GPs now seem to work a five day week with no emergency cover.

The Sun reports on an MP who is demanding inquests into the deaths of 92 elderly patients at a hospital. Tory Nigel Waterson has written to Justice Secretary Jack Straw urging action over Gosport War Memorial in Hampshire. The article mentions how Dr Harold Shipman is said to have killed 250 patients.

The Argus reports on fertility doctor Dr Edwin Onugha who is accused of sexually assaulting a patient but walked free from Guildford Crown Court after a jury took 15 minutes to find him not guilty.

There is widespread coverage of a new technique developed by Glasgow doctors that could save the NHS millions of pounds and cut hospital admissions all over the world. The new technique helps to spot dangerous internal bleeding.

The Evening Post reports on a woman who died in November last year after being admitted into hospital with dehydration and gastroenteritis. An inquest has heard how missing medical notes and an overdose of fluids could have been factors in her death.

The Press and Journal reports how junior medics claim they are being left out of pocket after being denied expenses. The British Medical Association says the short term contracts have big implications for mortgage applications and rental agreements.

In his column, Jeremy Laurance reviews the Healthcare Commission's report on the state of the NHS which includes figures showing that some primary care trusts did not report patient safety incidents. He concludes that it is likely that there were mistakes made but the culture of the profession means that they are not always reported.
