There is lots of coverage of swine flu. The Sunday Express reports on health officials' claims that swine flu cases in Britain have reached 20,000 and that the number is on target to hit one million by the end of the summer, as ministers predicted.

The Mail on Sunday features the week-long battle of the UK's first 'fit' swine-flu victim.

The People says that CMO Liam Donaldson has written to GPs, warning of more deaths in the autumn and the emergence of a more virulent strain of the bug, saying that they should give priority to early treatment with antivirals of those in the high risk group.

The Sunday Times reports that the NHS is preparing to vaccinate the entire population against swine flu and in a separate article that operations must be put on hold so the NHS can cope with the swine flu crisis: Dr Peter Holden, of the BMA's general practitioners committee, said the Government should put in place emergency plans to deal with a swine flu pandemic 'with immediate effect'.

The News of the World says that Scots are paying £125 for home swine flu kits after the Government announced GPs will stop swabbing for the bug and Scotland On Sunday says that Scotland is preparing for swine flu to return in a more serious form this winter, with the prospect of rising deaths from the growing number of people falling ill, as warned by the country's CMO.

Several papers mention End of life issues. John Humphrys, who called for the legalisation of euthanasia in his book The Welcome Visitor, claims in The Sunday Telegraph that his first wife was helped to die by her nurses. Baroness Campbel explains in The Sunday Telegraph her opposition to legalising assisted suicide, and an Observer column says that the response to the creation of human sperm was predictably hysterical and missed the point.

The Mail on Sunday resurrects the story of Dr David Kelly reporting that 13 doctors are demanding an inquest into Dr David Kelly's death. Dr Kelly's body was found six years ago this week in woods close to his Oxfordshire home, shortly after he was exposed as the source of a BBC news report questioning the grounds for war in Iraq.

A Sunday Times editorial says the NHS could start charging people to see their GP.

There is further coverage of the perils of undergoing cosmetic surgery. The Observer covers the 'significant rise' in the number of negligence claims against doctors who harm and even kill patients during cosmetic surgery. The Sunday Express runs a story that the NHS has paid out almost £4 million since 2004 to patients who woke from surgery to find doctors had operated on the wrong part of their body. And The Independent on Sunday and Sunday Mail continue the story of Denise Hendry whose Swedish cosmetic surgeon was reported to the GMC.
