Fitness to Practise

Following allegations of substandard patient care at the Yarl's Wood immigration detention centre, *The Guardian* reports that three doctors have been referred to the GMC for investigation. The doctors are not named in the article.

The Western Mail interviews the widow of the patient who died under the care of Dr Salawati Abdul Salam, recently suspended for four months by the GMC. Mrs Pamela Perriam claims the decision was "too lenient".

The Burton Mail reports that Code A is "under investigation" by the GMC. Dr Singh's fitness to practise hearing commenced on 15 March and is continuing.

The Cambridge News looks at the growing incidence of mumps in the community and quotes from the GMC's findings on fact in the case against Code A and colleagues.
