The Plymouth Herald reports that the GMC is writing to ask doctors to decide if they will need to apply for a licence to practice, when the law changes later this year. The article was placed by the media team.

BMA News (16 May 09)

• GMC guidance on good practice when referring patients to other doctors for treatment is mentioned in a brief news item in regards to an inquiry into the death a patient in Northern Ireland. The patients' various doctors argued over who was responsible for their care while their condition deteriorated

BMJ (16 May 09)

- A round-up of new items on the BMJ's website notes a blog from the head of Palliative care at the Royal Marsden Hospital, hoping to see an increase in advance care plans after "publication of guidance from the...GMC".

The Daily Telegraph reports how a mother died from meningitis five days after doctors told her family to "stop fussing" and diagnosed gastroenteritis. The family is considering legal action.

The Evening Standard reports that Great Ormond Street Hospital have tried to 'hide Baby P failings with a spin campaign'. This follows an article in the paper earlier this week which reported that all four consultants at the clinic at that time had written a letter to hospital management warning that 'understaffing at St Ann's created a "very high risk" to children's safety.'

The Yorkshire Post reports how millions of pounds is to be spent on improving end of life healthcare in Rotherham. People in the town will be asked next week about how they would like to be treated as part of Rotherham's 'At The End It Matters' campaign.

The Scotsman carried a story on 15 May about new targets for numbers of organ donors in Scotland.
