


Revalidation: Retired and other Inactive Doctors

- 1. I have read the papers.
- 2. As I understood the papers, the use of the template of Good Medical Practice is itself restrictive (cf Code A s Paper). Revalidation, for all doctors, needs to cover all the content headings in GMP, and the further explanations of those which may be prepared by the Colleges for each speciality.
- 3. 'Retired' doctors should have no special rights, because they are free to practice in a limited way if they choose. So if they choose to stay on, they should show their eligilibility like any other.
- 4. Equally, doctors inactive for any reason should nevertheless comply with the GMC requirements for revalidation.
- 5. A failure to follow this basic principle would result in the problems you describe in your para 4. But equally, we would be operating two standards especially if we allowed self-certification for one group which would be both wrong and potentially dangerous to patients.
- 6. If you could give me a ring on Friday 27 August we could speak fully about handling this.



Thank you for your letter of 29 July 1999 about the duty of doctors employed by medical defence organisations to report poor practice.

The position is as follows: all doctors on our register are accountable to us for their actions; we set out the standards we expect of them in our booklet *Good Medical Practice*. This makes clear that all doctors have a duty to put the safety of patients first at all times. Where doctors have good reason to believe that a colleague's health, conduct or performance is putting patients at risk they should take action appropriate to the nature, seriousness and urgency of the case. We tell them that:

'you must follow your employer's procedures or tell an appropriate person from the employing authority, such as the director of public health, medical director, nursing director or chief executive, or a regulatory body.' (*Good Medical Practice*, 1998)

This guidance applies to doctors who work in defence organisations.

We do not expect doctors always to report to us; they might find it helpful to report concerns locally since many problems can be dealt with quickly and effectively through local procedures and the defence organisations are well aware of these mechanisms. Nonetheless, problems must be reported to the GMC where, in order to safeguard patients, it is necessary to review a doctor's registration.

It is important from the GMC's point of view for doctors who find themselves in this position to have effective legal advice and support. We understand the difficulties faced by defence organisations in meeting their responsibilities to their clients and fulfilling their duties as registered medical practitioners. In order to discuss and explore these issues, we keep in regular touch with the leading medical defence organisations. Indeed, we will be sending them copies of this letter and the issue will no doubt be one of the matters discussed at our next meeting with them in early September.

Revalidation of Junior Doctors

Thank you for your letter of 12 July 1999 informing us of the Junior Doctors Committee's (JDC) three resolutions.

You will wish to know that on 27 July 1999 the Revalidation Steering Group formally approved the following recommendation:

Revalidation arrangements for doctors in training should be based as far as possible on existing arrangements for the monitoring, appraisal and assessment of such doctors.

The Group has asked the Education Committee to take work forward on revalidation arrangements for doctors in training.

I note the resolutions passed by the Junior Doctors Committee and am pleased that the GMC and the JDC are of one mind in our commitment to improve standards of medical practice.

With respect to the second resolution, I believe that Dr Jeremy Stern clarified the GMC's position at the Junior Doctors Consultative Group meeting on 23 June 1999. There is no question of removal from the register by default. As Code A explained, the only way in which a doctor could be removed from the register through administrative, rather than judicial, process (other than through failing to pay the annual retention fee or keeping the GMC informed of an up to date address) would be if they refused to participate in the revalidation process completely.

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As you point out, removing a doctor's registration should be a last resort. Council has already agreed a six stage outline of revalidation which allows for action to be taken locally to improve the practice of a doctor about whom there are concerns. This is in accordance with the GMC's established guidance (*Maintaining Good Medical Practice*) and in line with the forthcoming arrangements for clinical governance. Clearly where a doctor's practice seems to be falling below standard, every effort should be made locally to ensure that the doctor has the opportunity to make the necessary improvements. Only when such remedial action has been unsuccessful, or is impractical, would we expect a doctor to be referred to the GMC. Thereafter, no action will be taken on the registration of any doctor until the doctor had been subject to one of the GMC's existing fitness to practise procedures. This is in accordance with Council's decision on 10 February 1999 that:

The GMC's fitness to practise procedures provide a sufficient mechanism for the review of a doctor's registration on the grounds of serious dysfunction, and any consequent action in relation to a doctor's registration.

On the question of funding for junior doctors, as you know, this is not a matter over which the GMC has any control. However, we have made it clear that revalidation must be adequately resourced, and will continue to make this clear to those responsible for doctors' training.

You also mention the issue of revalidation arrangements for doctors who wish to return to the profession after a career break. As you will have seen from the draft report on Categories of Doctors on the Register, we have already identified that this group of doctors will provide some challenge in terms of developing revalidation proposals. The GMC does not want to discourage doctors from returning to active medical practice, but this must be married with the public expectation that all doctors on the register are up to date and fit to practise.

Further to Code A s letter to you of 24 June 1999, I would be very happy to talk to members of the Junior Doctors Committee or, alternatively, we could draft an article on revalidation for JDC members. In the light of the Revalidation Steering Group's recent decision, I feel that this would go a long way to dispelling some of the popular misconceptions about the purposes – and development – of revalidation.

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

Thank you for your letter of 13 May 1999 following up our conversation during the BMA Council meeting about GPs and the NHS Direct service. I am sorry that you did not receive an earlier reply. The delay in answering your letter is unforgivable and I apologise.

It was useful to see the copies of your local medical committee's article and the advice from the BMA's General Practice Committee. I note their comments on the legal considerations for doctors who wish to promote NHS Direct to their patients or intend to use NHS Direct as an out-of hours support service. However, you were concerned to explore what ethical considerations might arise and these are discussed below.

As I understand it, there are three possible ways in which GPS may wish to make use of NHS Direct. They might simply inform patients about its availability; or recommend that patients use NHS Direct as an alternative advice service; or use NHS Direct themselves to provide part of their out-of-hours support to patients. Additionally some GPs may be directly involved in providing a local NHS Direct service.

In general, when considering whether to make use of a particular healthcare service or to recommend it to patients, its doctors' responsibility to decide whether this would be in their patients' best interests.

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An important consideration would be whether the doctors or other practitioners providing the service would be able to provide safe, effective care for patients. Doctors who were delegating care to another service, or making arrangements for them to provide out-of-hours cover, would have an additional responsibility to ensure that there were effective arrangements for communication about the patient and any treatment or other care provided. The doctor would retain overall responsibility for the patients care. In any case where a doctor had a financial interest in a particular service, he or she would have to ensure that patients were aware of this, and that it did not affect his or her judgement in making recommendations or referring patients for treatment or care. These are the principles which underly the advice we give in *Good Medical Practice* about arranging cover (see paragraphs 34-35); delegation and referral (see paragraphs 39-41); and about avoiding conflicts of interest (paragraphs 49-52).

Where doctors wish only to make patients aware of the availability of other services, it would be important that any information provided was factual and objective, and presented in a way that avoided putting patients under pressure to use the service. This is similar to the principles that underly the advice in *Good Medical Practice* on providing information about a doctor's own services (see paragraphs 44-47).

You will see that the issues outlined above are not inconsistent with the advice in the GPC statement.

I hope that this is of help in considering how best to take forward your concerns about GPs use of NHS Direct. If you have any additional points which you would like to raise, by all means get in touch.



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

I will deal with the small suggestion first.

On page 16 – in the last line – you refer to the Bristol Inquiry as lasting for over 65 days. To be exact the Committee sat for 74 days.

Secondly, there is one major omission that I hope you will find space to include. Following the Bristol Case we set about establishing revalidation which is, I think, the most significant change to medical regulation this half century. Already substantial progress has been made, taking revalidation forward and seeing how it can be aligned with cinical governance.




Thank you for your letter of 26 July 1999 about the impact of the judgment in R and the Department of Health ex parte Source Informatics on the use of anonymised data in epidemiology and other research.

As you requested, the PAC considered whether we should directly support Source Informatics in their appeal of this judgment. However, we concluded, that while we were sympathetic to the position Source Informatics is taking, and concerned about the effects of this judgment, it was unwise for the GMC to be seen to be closely associated with either of the parties to this case.

We agreed, however, that we should consider intervening by other means, which we understand may now be possible, following the recommendations of the Woolf Report. We are currently investigating the practicalities of going down such a route, and will report back to the PAC at its meeting 16 September 1999.

You may be interested to note that in the wider discussion of the effect of this judicial review judgment on our guidance, we agreed that we should not at present issue our new guidance, and that we should arrange an informal discussion with ACHCEW to discuss the problems and possible ways forward. Again I will keep PAC informed of our progress.

Working Group on the Professional Conduct Committee

I am writing to every member of the PCC Working Group to let you know about decisions taken by the Fitness to Practise Policy Committee (FPPC) on 21 July 1999.

The FPPC considered how the Group's report should be taken forward in the light of the discussion in Council in May 1999. I enclose a copy of the paper the FPPC discussed.

You will see that the paper, which Code A had seen and approved in advance, noted that the Group's task had largely been completed and that most of the remaining questions to be determined concerned fundamental issues about the fitness to practise procedures as a whole, rather than the PCC alone. In that light, the paper recommended that from here on the FPPC should co-ordinate the further work which is required, although it would be open to the FPPC to reconstitute the Group in the future. The FPPC accepted all the recommendations in the paper, and the Group's work is therefore at an end. The task of implementing its recommendations (some of which Council will need to consider further) now begins.

The Group produced a very thorough report. It identified solutions to numerous anomalies and loopholes in our procedures and pointed the way forward in a number of crucial policy areas. I am very grateful to you for the contribution which you made to it.




Working Group on the Professional Conduct Committee

I am writing to every member of the PCC Working Group to let you know about decisions taken by the Fitness to Practise Policy Committee (FPPC) on 21 July 1999.

The FPPC considered how the Group's report should be taken forward in the light of the discussion in Council in May 1999. I enclose a copy of the paper the FPPC discussed.

You will see that the paper, which Code A had seen and approved in advance, noted that the Group's task had largely been completed and that most of the remaining questions to be determined concerned fundamental issues about the fitness to practise procedures as a whole, rather than the PCC alone. In that light, the paper recommended that from here on the FPPC should co-ordinate the further work which is required, although it would be open to the FPPC to reconstitute the Group in the future. The FPPC accepted all the recommendations in the paper, and the Group's work is therefore at an end. The task of implementing its recommendations (some of which Council will need to consider further) now begins.

Thank you for your letter of 6 June 1999 to Code A about the GMC elections and the future composition of the Council. I am replying on behalf of the President; I am very sorry to have taken so long to reply.

We will be reviewing all aspects of the electoral process. The unprecedented number of candidates in England raised a number of practical difficulties about the presentation of information to electors, and may well have contributed to the disappointing turnout in the constituency. We will be looking closely at the options.

Smaller constituencies would not be without their own problems; they would need to be of roughly equal size; and we lack natural regional boundaries. The 1999 elections revealed a number of address changes in England of which we were not aware (in addition to the 500 address changes that we are informed of each week). Address changes that resulted in a change of constituency could present an issue, which we hardly had to face at all this year. There is also an argument that smaller constituencies work against minority candidates.

We need also to look at how we present candidates' information to electors; one possibility could be lists of candidates within particular categories (say, by age; gender; specialty), without establishing constituencies for those categories.

From November 1999, almost exactly half the members of Council will be new. This includes newly appointed lay and medical members, as well as those recently elected. We will be looking at how we maintain continuity without making Council membership any less accessible.

The composition of the Council's membership has changed three times since 1987. The trend has been to increase the number of elected and lay members and to decrease the number of appointed medical members, while preserving the majority of elected members as recommended by the Merrison Committee.

You propose that elected GMC members should be practising. I comment only that we face the very real problem of an ever-increasing workload for Council members, particularly for fitness to practise hearings. Retired members can bring a great deal of experience and expertise to our work, and they have the time to devote to lengthy or multiple cases. The Council will be considering how we cope with these increasing demands in the future.

No decisions have been made on any of these issues. We shall be consulting on the outcome of our review in due course.

I enclose, for your information, a copy of the report of the Steering Group. The recommendations in the report were accepted by the Council at its meeting, with the exception of those relating to governance which will be the subject of further discussion with the bodies which currently appoint members to the PLA Board.

The Steering Group recommended that the current structure of the test – a written examination, followed by an OSCE for those who have passed the written part of the test – should remain. In order to remove subjectivity, however, it is proposed that the written paper should be computer markable. A number of examiners have been involved in the review and will be taking forward the recommendations in the report.

I note your comments about the UEB. I should point out, however, that the PLAB test is not a qualifying examination for the purposes of the Medical Act: indeed, it has no legal status. We are, however, prepared to accept a pass in the test as providing objective evidence of a doctor's capability to work in supervised posts under limited registration. In this respect, it is similar to the licensing examinations conducted by registration authorities in other parts of the world.

Thank you for your letter of 11 June 1999 about the elections to the GMC. This followed a report to your Executive Committee.

As **Code A** for the elections, I do understand the concerns expressed, particularly as reports in the medical press consistently exaggerated the scale of the problem despite extensive briefing by us.

The fault was confined to the constituency of England, where we received a total of 12 reports of defective sets of election papers. This compares with the 132,000 sets which were dispatched to doctors on the register.

I doubt whether, realistically, any affordable process can be guaranteed to be error free. However, we are certainly not complacent; and I do not underestimate how confidence can be damaged when an error of this kind occurs. For that and other reasons we will be reviewing all aspects of the elections to ensure that we learn any lessons. Meanwhile, we have kept the position under close and continuing scrutiny.



On 18 May 1999 you kindly wrote to me about the arrangements for training junior doctors. I understand that since then, you have received comments from the Code A of the Royal College of Physicians of London to whom, amongst others, you had copied your letter.

Matters concerning the education of doctors undertaking postgraduate training, insofar as they fall within the remit of the GMC, are dealt with by our Education Committee. You will, I am sure, have seen a copy of our latest recommendations on the training of senior house officers, *The Early Years*, Which we published in December 1998.

This deals with the generic aspects of training at SHO grade, and emphasises the importance of the educational elements. Our guidance also suggests ways of maximising the educational experience of doctors in SHO posts, whatever their service load or their working patterns.

The Specialist Training Authority, rather than the GMC, is the competent authority for overseeing postgraduate training and issuing certificates of specialist training to hospital doctors who have trained in the UK, in terms of the European Medical Directive. A similar function in relation to doctors in primary care is performed by the Joint Committee for Postgraduate Training in General Practice. I am sure that Code A who is a GMC member as well as Chairman of the STA, would be interested to read your comments about the experience needed for consultant appointments in the UK.

Thank you for your letter of 22 April 1999; I am very sorry for the delay in replying.

As you know, we regard doctors in management positions as responsible for ensuring that appropriate action is taken when significant concerns about a doctor's fitness to practise are brought to their attention. We may hold the Medical Director (and Chairman of the Trust if he or she is a registered medical practitioner) responsible for ensuring that patients; safety is not compromised and the doctor is not allowed to return to unsupervised practice until either the concerns are proved unfounded or the doctor's deficiencies have been rectified.

In the circumstances you describe, you have a responsibility to act fairly towards the doctor who has been retrained, and an overriding obligation to ensure, as far as possible, that patients' safety is not compromised.


The best way forward would be to obtain from the training centre an assessment of whether the doctor's deficiencies have been remedied by the training they have provided. I would suggest you try again to persuade them to provide this. In my view, all registered medical practitioners have a professional responsibility to participate, when reasonably asked to do so, in the assessment and retraining of doctors, where that is necessary for the protection and safety of patients.

Alternatively you could seek a further assessment of the doctor from another training centre or from a professional association. This would not necessarily need to be in the form of a formal opinion on the surgeon's fitness to return to work. It could, however, provide the basis for your decision on whether the surgeon should resume responsibilities and whether it was appropriate to provide supervision for a period, and if so, the nature and extent of that supervision.

If, despite best efforts, none of the options which I have suggested is capable of resolving the problem, you would have to consider a referral to our fitness to practise procedures. If (as seems likely) the concerns about the doctor are centred upon performance issues rather than conduct, we would require evidence of events, dating from 1 July 1997 (the date upon which our performance procedures became operational), suggesting seriously deficient performance. We would, of course, consider any such evidence and, if we concluded that it called into question the doctor's continuing unrestricted registration, we would initiate our own proceedings.

I hope that this is of help in dealing with what is clearly a difficult problem.

Revalidation

Thank you for your letter of 26 May 1999. I was pleased to learn that the Medical Women's Federation (MWF) supports revalidation.

You raise concerns about doctors engaged in a variety of fields of practise. The Revalidation Steering Group has already highlighted a number of areas in which arrangements for revalidation may be particularly complex – namely for locum doctors, doctors undertaking research, doctors working abroad and doctors who, for whatever reason, are not engaged in active medical practise.

Moreover, at Council's revalidation debate on 25 May 1999, the issue of doctors returning to practise after a career break was considered. It was agreed that it would be counter-productive for the profession as a whole to make it too difficult for doctors to return to medicine after a career break. The challenge for us all over the next two years will be to develop arrangements for revalidation which balance the needs of the profession against the public expectation that all doctors on the register are fit to practise.

You are also concerned about the provision of resources for revalidation. Council has already agreed that the introduction of any system of revalidation will require adequate resources - human and financial. Without such resources, the data, time and analysis required could not be delivered, and the purpose of the scheme - the promotion and assurance of good standards of care for all patients- would be lost. Discussions with Government and others will be required to ensure that the introduction of revalidation is linked with the provision of necessary resources.

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In developing proposals for revalidation, Council is committed to a process which is as open and transparent as possible. With this in mind, we will, very soon, be engaging the MWF in a formal consultation exercise designed to ensure that the views of every sector of the profession are considered. We hope that you will be able to work with the GMC to take this important work forward. Meanwhile, however, I would be happy to meet with you informally to discuss any other issues of concern. Convictions among medical students

Thank you for your letter of 25 May 1999.

The GMC has no direct responsibility for the admission of individual medical students to the undergraduate course. This is a matter for the universities with medical schools.

We understand that all prospective university students are required to declare any convictions they may have acquired, when submitting their applications for entry. In terms of our guidance in *Good Medical Practice*, we would expect those involved with medical student admissions to take a robust view of convictions which would bring a qualified doctor within the purview of our fitness to practise procedures.

The Council of Heads of Medical Schools has been active in this area and has recently published on its website a statement of guiding principles for the admission of medical students. The Deans have made it clear that criminal convictions may call into question candidates' fitness to embark on training for our profession, even though they have achieved the requisite level of academic attainment.

The circular you mention is specifically concerned with doctors and other NHS staff working with children, and the advice it contains is consonant with paragraph 21 of our own guidance about general clinical training in general practice,

published in July 1998. Our recommendations do, however, cover vulnerable patients generally and not just children.

There is presently no requirement to carry out police checks on medical students, perhaps because they are deemed not to have unsupervised access to young children when on paediatric attachments in the hospital or community. I understand, however, that a group convened by the NHSE is presently reviewing the existing guidance on medical students in hospitals, published by the former Management Executive in April 1991. One of the issues the group has been considering is the advice that should be given about access to paediatric patients. If you are agreeable, I would like to forward a copy of your letter to Dr Gabriel Scally, who is chairing the group, since I am sure its members would find your comments helpful.

As you are aware, on 10 February 1999 the General Medical Council endorsed key recommendations for the implementation of revalidation for all registered doctors.

Council is now embarking upon a programme of consultation and development to enable us to take these principles forward. Council aims, within two years, to consider a fully worked up model for revalidation.

In taking this work forward, Council will be looking at all doctors in whichever environment they may work - both within and outside the NHS. It will also be considering how to make arrangements for registered doctors who are retired or who are not practising medicine on a regular basis. We are at the earliest stage of development at the moment, and I regret that I cannot yet be more specific about how arrangements for retired doctors will work.

The paper to Council in February argued that an effective revalidation process must start with good methods and good data designed to give a continuing and objective profile of a doctor's performance. By way of illustration, these profiles could be based on data showing the doctor's record of continuing educational activity along with records of other activities. Of course many doctors already keep diaries or log books of CME activity. The implementation of revalidation procedures will have to be timetabled to ensure that unnecessary problems are not caused for all those doctors who are perfectly fit to practice.

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All doctors will be up kept up to date on the progress of the revalidation project in future issues of GMC News. Moreover, important papers considered by the Revalidation Steering Group will be placed on our website - www.gmc-uk.org - which is regularly updated.

Re: Code A GMC Investigation into patients' allegations of sexual misconduct/assault.

As promised in our brief discussion in Harrogate here is a brief summary of events leading up to investigations being initiated by the General Medical Council.

Code A was employed as a Consultant Psychiatrist at Clifton Hospital, York in the 1970s and 80s. There were rumours about sexual misconduct with female patients in the early 80s when I arrived in York as a Consultant Psychiatrist. Between 1984 and 1988, some women in particular made allegations of misconduct, but in each case refused to co-operate with any further investigation of the complaint. In 1988 I became District General Manager and after yet another allegation that the patient was unwilling to pursue I referred the matter to the Regional Medical Officer who persuaded Code A to retire.

My informal contacts in the City of York prevented him seeing patients at private hospitals and rooms but he did obtain employment at a private hospital in Harrogate and subsequently was appointed Medical Director of the North Durham Trust.

In 1997 the police started an investigation into allegations of sexual assault against another Consultant Psychiatrist who also had worked at Clifton Hospital in the 70s and 80s. They wrote to a large number of female patients who had been under the care of Code A and this attracted press publicity which did not name Code A As a consequence, four women came forward each willing to pursue their complaints, three of whom had raised allegations in the 80s.

The police decided that there were no grounds for criminal charges after investigating the complaints of these women. The General Medical Council was first notified of complaints in November 1997 but decided to await the outcome of an NHS independent review set up by the Northern and Yorkshire NHS Executive. The outcome of this review was never published, mainly I think on legal advice because

Code A declined to respond to any questions of the panel. Code A the then Regional Director referred the matter to the General Medical Council.

Meanwhile Code A was suspended from his Medical Director post in Durham and was subsequently dismissed.

There was some perturbation in York when we heard the news that Code A would not have to answer the serious complaints against him simply because he had sought and had been granted removal from the register. I do know that Board members and the York Psychiatrists and others who are familiar with the above mentioned events believe there is a serious case to answer. One of the complainants has already let me know how distressed and hurt she is at this outcome.

Psychiatrists that the General Medical Council had changed its rules and no longer allowed Doctors to withdraw from the Register during an investigation into misconduct. Indeed he said that the Registrar of the College had held a conversation with a senior officer of the GMC on the 9 February last year who had confirmed to her that this was now the GMC position. We were therefore quite surprised to hear that Code A had been allowed to withdraw his name from the register.

It is difficult to predict whether there will be more publicity. After both Code A s and Code A s names had appeared in the Press with some information about the kind of allegations against them, a local MP was calling for a public enquiry. With Code A indicted for rapes and sexual assaults and Code A under investigation by the GMC there has been little further publicity presumably because all matters are sub-judice. But we do think that there is continued newspaper and television interest.

It would be most helpful to have some comment and advice from you on the reasons for the GMC decision.

In 1995 the GMC issued new guidance in a series of leaflets collectively titled *Duties* of a Doctor. The core leaflet, *Good Medical Practice*, changed the focus of the advice from warning doctors against making malicious comments, to placing a clear duty on them to take action to protect patients:

'You must protect patients when you believe that a doctor's or other colleague's health, conduct or performance is a threat to them.

'Before taking action, you should do your best to find out the facts. Then, if necessary, you must follow your employer's procedures or tell an appropriate person from the employing authority, such as the director of public health, medical director, nursing director or chief executive, or an officer of your local medical committee or a regulatory body. Your comments about colleagues must be honest. The safety of patients must come first at all times.'

The guidance on 'disparagement' is given separately and its scope is narrow -

'You must not make any patient doubt a colleague's knowledge or skills by making unnecessary or unsustainable comments about them.'

The emphasis on protecting patients, rather than on preserving the reputation of colleagues, is reflected in decisions taken by our fitness to practise committees and

Revalidation of Junior Doctors

Thank you for your letter of 13 May 1999 in which you ask for comments on the Junior Doctor's Committee guidance for the postgraduate education, appraisal and assessment of trainees.

The GMC is quite clear that mechanisms for revalidation should be based, as far as possible, on existing arrangements. This was reiterated at our Council meeting on 25 May 1999.

As we discussed, we all now need to be sure that the current systems of medical regulation at local levels are working adequately. With this in mind, I am most encouraged by the guidance produced by your working group. It is easy to see how the evidence produced during a junior doctor's period in training — as recorded in a learning portfolio - could be used as evidence of continuing fitness to practise and, therefore, of revalidation. A robust system of this kind will simultaneously meet the educational and career needs of the individual doctor, the quality assurance requirements of the employer, and the fitness to practise requirements of the GMC.

You might wish to consider making some reference in your guidance to *Good Medical Practice* which sets out the standards the GMC expects of all doctors. While your guidance reflects the precepts in *Good Medical Practice*, it might be helpful to make this point more explicit. This is of particular relevance given that on 25 May 1999, Council decided that the demonstration of a doctor's fitness to practise in revalidation should be set against the principles of *Good Medical Practice*.

Revalidation of Junior Doctors

Thank you for your letter of 6 May 1999 about the two resolutions carried by the Junior Doctor's Committee on 19 March 1999. You explain that your Committee felt that revalidation arrangements for doctors in training should not involve the imposition of processes in addition to those mechanisms of assessment which already exist.

In endorsing the recommendation that:

The regular demonstration by all registered doctors that they remain fit to practise in their chosen field is best assured by a link with continued registration,

Council also agreed that revalidation arrangements should be based, as far as possible, on existing local arrangements. Moreover, while revalidation will apply to all registered doctors, the mechanisms for implementing the process will necessarily vary according to individual doctors' specialties, grades and working environments.

As you have pointed out, doctors in training should already undergo regular monitoring, assessment and appraisal. With this in mind, I was particularly encouraged to read the Junior Doctor's Committee guidance for the education, appraisal and assessment of trainees which Dr Trevor Pickersgill has kindly provided to me and upon which I have commented. I agree that we should be looking to build on these existing systems. If those systems were rigorously

implemented, they would simultaneously meet the educational and career needs of junior doctors, the quality requirements of employers and the fitness to practise requirements of the GMC. In that way, we can avoid parallel appraisal procedures which you – and we – consider to be unnecessarily burdensome.

In the next two years Council will be looking at how we can all be sure that these local systems are working properly, and producing the standard and quality of evidence necessary for revalidation.

You are also concerned about the provision of resources for revalidation. Council has already agreed that the introduction of any system of revalidation will require adequate resources - human and financial. Without such resources, the data, time and analysis required could not be delivered, and the purpose of the scheme - the promotion and assurance of good standards of care for all patients- would be lost. Discussions with Government and others will be required to ensure that the introduction of revalidation is linked with the provision of necessary resources.

In developing proposals for revalidation, Council is committed to a process which is as open and transparent as possible. With this in mind, we will, very soon, be engaging junior doctors in a formal consultation exercise designed to ensure that the views of every sector of the profession are considered. We hope that your committee will work with the GMC to take this important work forward.

Council has now agreed a structure to enable us to consult formally with representatives of the profession at every level and in every main field of practise. This is in addition to the comments and suggestions we have been receiving from members of the profession who have taken up the invitation issued in the Spring edition of *GMC News* to contact the regulation policy section with queries and suggestions. These views are being regularly reported back to the Revalidation Steering Group who will, in turn, incorporate into their deliberations, the concerns and expectations of doctors working in the field.

Please be assured that we are all very much aware of the important issues you raise. In accordance with the recommendations made by Council in February, membership of the Revalidation Steering Group has now been increased to 16. Of the 12 medical members in the group, most are in active medical practice.
