I know this was really an aside in our last meeting about Moving and Handling re: The HSE's query about whether we have a replacement programme for hoist slings. However, I did agree to have a look to see whether any sling failures had actually happened within the 3 PCTs.

I have trawled the 25000+ incidents recorded since we have been using the safeguard system for any mention of hoist slings in the incident description. On the attached sheet are the very few incidents where a hoist sling has been said to have been at least a partial cause of a patient safety incident. There only appears to be one clear instance where the sling equipment has failed causing injury. There was some discussion at the meeting about potentially diminishing integrity of the sling material over time and depending on the way in which it is treated. To date we have not had a recorded incident where this caused a sling to fail.

I would like to add a few words of caution because I do not want this to be interpreted as an assumption that slings are low risk. Given the physical nature of some of our respective service users, a single failure of a sling causing a patient to fall could cause very serious or quite possibly fatal injuries. My other concern is that this information does not reflect situations where a sling is picked up as dangerously degraded and removed from use by a nurse. These are not reported as incidents rather replacements are ordered. Without a replacement program we are placing complete reliance on nurses remembering to sufficiently check each area of the hoist and sling. Richard - I suspect it might be terribly difficult to pick out from the community equipment request forms where existing slings have been reported faulty (?)

I hope this of some interest to a few of you.
