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INQUIRY: Police investigation of 91-year-old woman's death may lead to probe into hundreds of other cases

A HOSPITAL was today at the centre of a major police investigation into the alleged unlaw-

tigation into the alleged unlaw-ful killing of an elderly patient. Detectives have sent a file on the case to be examined by prosecutors after a long-running inquiry into events surrounding the death of a 91-year-old woman at Gosport War Memorial Hospital. And senior officers say they cannot rule out having to reopen the files on hundreds more deaths at the hospi-tal.

cal staff at the hospital. None has been arrested or questioned under cau-tion, but officers have sent a file to the Crown Prosecution Service seek-ing advice on how they might proceed with the in-outer quiry.

the hospital. One source told *The News* the deaths of as many as 600 elderly peo-ple could be re-examined. It is thought the use of the pain-killing drug diamorphine might form a part of any future inquiry

In a statement today Hampshire po-lice said: 'Police have completed their investigation into the circumstances surrounding the death of a 91-year-old woman from Lee-on-the-So-lent after a complaint by her family. 'She died in August 1998 at the War Memorial Hospital in Gosport af-ter being thread them from Day

ter being transferred there from Roy-al Hospital Haslar. In line with patient confidential-ity, we cannot reveal the nature of her medical condition. We have the full co-operation of Portsmouth HealthCare (NHS) Trust and the Royal Hospital Haslar for our investigation. tal. The probe was triggered by a com-plaint from the pensioner's family over the standard of care she re-ceived at the hospital in the days be-fore she died there in August 1998. Today her daughter, Gillian Mac-kenzie, refused to be drawn on the inquiry but said: T hope I will never see anyone die in the circumstances in which my mother died.' Detectives working on the inquiry have interviewed a number of medi-cal staff at the hospital.

Lawyers are now decid-ing whether there is suffi-clent evidence to bring a prosecution for alleged un-lawful killing. The Awas understands that if they do so, senior officers will consider re-opening files on the deaths of other patients at the hospital. One source told The

GOSPORT War Memorial Hospital GOSPORT War Memorial Hospital provides services for elderly patients, including those with mental health problems, as well as mothers and bables on the Blake maternity unit. From a modest beginning which saw it with 26 beds when it opened in 1923, it has more than trebled in size. The people of Gosport are intensely proud of the complex – and very defensive of it. When it was threatened with closure in

When it was threatened with closure in a 1980s health shake-up, a huge

campaign was launched. The campaign didn't meraly convince health chiefs to keep it open but also to invest in it, and a £10m revamp was ordered which made the hospital much bigger and gave it a range of state-of-the-art facilities. The hospital was officially opened on April 28, 1923, after it was built by Gosport-based Royal Marines – with money raised from Gosport people – as a memorial to those who had died in the first world war.

Daughter's complaint leads to rap for detectives

THE daughter of the 91-year-old patient today launched a stinging attack on the original police investigation into the death of her mother. Gillian Mackenzie, who lives in Sussex, rounded on the handling of the inquiry by a Gosport CID team insisting officers failed to do a proper iob job.

She protested to the Police

Complaints Authority. It upheld her complaint and as a result disciplinary and as a result disciplinary action was taken against De-tective Inspector Steph Mor-gan of Gos-port police and a sec-ond officer.

'Literally within a few weeks I had a phone call from a police officer saying it was his opinion that there was no

his opinion that there was no case to answer.' Mrs Mackenzie described the second police investiga-tion - led by DCI Ray Burt, now based at Winchester po-lice headquarters - as 'first-elses'.

His disappearance sparked a massive land and seashore search by military and civilian police but no trace was found of him.



charge of slaughter, transport, burn-al and incineration of animals. The Tory leader claimed that officials at Nick Brown's Ministry of Agriculture are badly over-stretched, and that farmers are in-creasingly angry about delays in identifying, slaughtering and dispos-ing of infected livestock.

'Infected animals are breathing the disease into the air, contaminat-ing more and more farms,' Mr Hague said.

Hague said. Mr Hague has consistently sought to use the army's potential role as a stick with which to beat the Government over its efforts to combat the disease. The Tories have argued that the ops should have been brought in at a much earlier stage, and in far larger numbers.
