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identification reference PJW/1 and from this sheet I can state the following:-

Job number 16 for that day shows that we moved a patient called RICHARDS from Ward E3 at the Royal Naval Hospital Haslar to Daedalus Ward at the Gosport War memorial Hospital. The patient was collected at 1130 hrs and we arrived at Gosport at 1200 hrs. The work sheet also has S.T. alongside this job which indicates that this was a stretcher case. As I can not recall this particular patient I can only state the method normally used in stretcher cases, which is whereby a canvas sheet is placed under the patient. The ambulance crew then insert poles and stays to make the canvas rigid. In some cases a patch slide is used to transfer patients from bed onto the canvas, this involves inserting a smooth board under the patient and lower bed sheet and then sliding the patient sideways onto the canvas. This is the only method we would use to move a stretcher patient.

If any complications are experienced during a patient transfer they are noted on the work sheet, as there are no notes recorded on the work sheet, I would assume this was a straight forward transfer.
